Plant of the Month

Papple Sweet Johnny

Looks and tastes like an apple but has the skin and texture of a pear. A NZ bred hybrid of European and Asian pears with stunning almost fluorescent pinkish-red skin. Sweeter and more complex flavours than traditional nashi with the



same juiciness. This plant was released in small numbers last year and was a hit and is now available again. The papple is self fertile but will fruit better with another pear or nashi close by. *Available in store or online at www.oderings.co.nz*

Flower Garden

As summer flowers pass their best remove them and prepare the ground for planting for Winter/Spring flowers like pansy, wall flowers, polyanthus and violas.

Now is bulb planting time. Choose good firm unblemished bulbs and plant as soon as possible so they get a good start.

Sow sweet peas now in good deep dug soil to get a good early flowering.

Cut back any perennials that have finished flowering; many can be lifted and divided later in the month.

Pelargonium and geraniums can now be propagated for next season.

Fruit & Vegetable Garden

Continue to harvest tomatoes, peppers, beans and cucumbers as soon as they are ready to encourage them to continue to produce.

Remove and dispose of any plants that show signs of disease to stop it from spreading to other plants do not compost.

Sow green crops on any ground not in use over the winter to improve soil structure.

Harvest apples and pears as soon as they are ready and still firm so that they will keep better.

Cut pumpkins and leave to dry for a few days before storing them.

Remove old tomato plants from the green house as soon as the crop has finished so the green house can be disinfected before the cold of winter.

Lawns & Paths

Spray for the weeds before the weather gets too cold.

Apply fertilizer now to get a good cover of grass before the frosts.

Do not cut the grass too low.

Spray any paths that tend to get moss on during the winter to stop the moss growing before it starts.
