# The Canterbury Horticultural Society is New Zealand's largest and most active gardening group. The Society celebrated its 150th anniversary in 2011.

## **Interactive Horticulture**

Helping members to learn about horticulture is a key aim of the Society. Talks, lectures, workshops, specialist circles and practical demonstrations form the basis of our education programme.

The Society has enjoyed a significant period of historical and developmental change with the adoption of a new constitution, a strategic plan and a smaller Board in which members have accepted responsibility for specific portfolios. Underpinning these changes has been a notable turnaround in our financial position from a net loss of \$166,186 in 2012 to a net surplus of \$34,580 in 2013. Details of our financial performance and position can be found on page 13 of this report.

# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I thank Alan Jolliffe and the Finance Committee he leads for the hard work and effort expended on tightening the Society's budgets and financial controls. Alan was also a major contributor to the new strategic plan. In a similar vein I acknowledge and thank the Hon Jim Anderton for his contribution in his Sponsorship and Funding portfolio, particularly for his work on the donations and bequest programmes. It is appropriate at this point to thank our members most sincerely for their magnificent response to the donations programme which raised \$14,387.

I thank Athol McCully who has embraced the Property portfolio supervising the maintenance and integrity of the Hagley Centre, including the pending earthquake repairs. Athol has acted as the Society's spokesperson in respect of Canterbury Cricket's proposal for the Hagley Oval. Under his leadership the Society has maintained a neutral stance on the issue subject to the protection of members' safety and access to the Centre.

Annette Hill acquired the Events and Membership portfolio in addition to her role as President of the Garden Club and Floral Art Reps Committee, with the Garden Clubs providing much voluntary support for our shows, the Festival of Flowers and the Ellerslie Flower Show. I thank her and the volunteers for all their contributions.

Ray King has led the Education portfolio which features new workshops, fruit tree planting in two schools and the planting of cherry blossoms and daffodils at Addington School. Carole and Jim Anderton, supported by students from CPIT's School of Architecture have overseen the development of berry gardens and orchards at West Spreydon and Rowley Schools. It is hoped that these initiatives will lead to a citywide programme especially in lower decile schools where access to high quality organically grown food can help meet pupils' nutritional requirements.

# **Personnel Changes**

The resignations of Shirley Russ (Manager), Freda Hunter (Tour Manager) and the sad and sudden passing of long serving Administrator Helen Wilson created significant problems at operational level.

The Board is indebted to the support of several volunteers during this period. Subsequent appointments of Tony Kunowski (Manager) and Liz Parder (Administrator) have created a friendly and efficient office environment and we can now look forward to improvements in every facet of our operations.



#### Activities

Existing activities such as All About Gardening, the Spring and Summer Garden Awards, the Ramblers, Ellerslie Flower Show and Tours, Junior Gardening, annual Garage Sale and Quiz Night were all well attended and supported by volunteers and members. The biennial Margaret Watling event, themed "Creative Edge", was held in conjunction with the Festival of Flowers and involved an inspiring demonstration and workshop.

New activities included the Edible Garden Awards initiated by the Shirley/Papanui Community Board, Members' Night at Oderings Nursery and our exhibit at the Canterbury A&P Show.

# FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

•

The Society suffered losses in 2010/11 and 2011/12 due to investment losses and excessive operating costs.

The new Board adopted a very conservative approach to managing the Society's affairs in the 2012/13 financial year whilst ensuring current or improved services to members.

# The end result is a surplus of \$34,580. There are some one-off gains in salary savings of \$31,737 and smaller savings in other areas of our operations. The surplus has been invested to increase our investments.

The most pleasing aspect is the members support to our request for donations with members giving over \$14,500 during the year. This living gift is warmly received and we will continue to accept donations for our operations and for special projects in the future.

The Hagley Centre traded very well this year generating an increase in income of \$26,981, largely due to increased hireage reflecting to a degree the shortage of similar facilities in the inner city area. Our Tours programme was also well supported with income increasing by \$42,886 and this provides a strong platform for future growth.

Investments continue to provide us with income but the current low interest rate regime has reduced this income source and this provides a real challenge to operate as efficiently as possible. Additional activities will be curtailed until interest rates increase or we widen our income sources via sponsorship and funding.

# Of continuing concern is the level of subscription income which reflects the size of our membership base.

This year's figure reflects two things, members resigning and a slow growth in obtaining new members. The expansion and rejuvenation of the Society's membership is a major challenge in the years ahead.

Our new budget for the 2013-2014 financial year reflects investment in our future directions to ensure we provide great experiences for our members and potential members. Our programmes and activities are vital for the participants and for the greater Christchurch community.

We are still maintaining a conservative approach to our financial management to ensure a continual improvement in our financial position but future surpluses are unlikely to be as dramatic as this year.

# FUTURE DIRECTIONS

We have developed four strategic directions for the Society to improve services and over time increase revenue. Some things we have already started.
