CHS SUPPORTS CITY ORCHARD

The Food Resilience Network (FRN) was successful in securing a five year lease on a block of land in the North Frame to develop a community orchard and garden, with a café.

A large collaboration quickly formed around the project – which has the working title Ōtākaro Orchard – taking in around 30 organisations and businesses, including the Christchurch City Council and Community and Public Health, alongside Permaculture Canterbury, the Food Forest Collective, Canterbury Horticultural Society, Canterbury Community Gardens Association, WOOD Ltd and many more.

"Our vision is of a top-quality community garden and orchard, working in conjunction with a social enterprise café run jointly by several social service agencies.

It will be a place for education about growing food – with community workshops, vocational training and informal learning all taking place here, within the context of a caring, nurturing environment.

Finally, it will be a place for residents and visitors alike to come together and share food and a place to rest and reflect on the future for the Garden City and we feel really honoured to be holding this space next to the Earthquake Memorial. We feel this garden and orchard will be a healing place for our community," said Dr Morris.

It is also a shop front for the regionwide food resilience movement that has been gathering momentum since the devastating earthquakes. The idea is simply to make good food more accessible to more people in our communities.

A givealittle crowd-funding campaign has been set up to help fund the project, valued at \$1.7m. The team is also looking for project partners to support the project. "We have had some great offers already, such as from engineering company GHD and we are on the lookout for more," Dr Morris said.

MONTHLY TIPS & TASKS With Michael Coulter

March late Summer and the start of the early Autumn season is a time of harvest and preparation for Winter crops. Apples and pears are at their very best and nothing can compare with the flavour of tree ripened fruit.

There is still plenty of colour in the flower garden, to keep the flowers in bloom remove the spent flowers and cut back excess growth. Keep gardens weed free as this reduces pest and disease on our plants and the seeds from dropping on the ground to grow next year.

Dahlias and chrysanthemums are in full bloom now. There are a number of flower shows coming up which show these blooms at their very best and are well worth a look.

The days are getting shorter but can still be very warm so watering should be maintained to keep plants growing well. I like to do this in the morning so that plants are dry at night and fungus diseases are not encouraged.

Lawns

- 1. Mow lawns each week but not too low.
- 2. Feed and weed type fertilisers can now be applied.
- 3. De thatching of lawns before Winter can begin.
- 4. New lawns may now be sown so that they are established before Winter.
- 5. Look out for fungus diseases in grass and treat if needed.





Christchurch Botanic Gardens News *Kirsten Tui MacFarlane reports on a makeover for big trees & new ways to enhance visitor experience*

The Christchurch Botanic Gardens attracts around 1.2 million visitors a year, and in August we're expecting 50,000 visitors for Botanic D'Lights. All this foot traffic is great for business, but has a big impact on our environs. In particular the big trees on Armstrong Lawn needed attention.

Bede Nottingham, Team Leader of Operations for Hagley Park and the Botanic Gardens, says foot traffic impacts the soil around trees and this leads to root damage.

"We had to find an efficient way to mitigate the damage, so we're trialling a new technique called 'air spading' which uses great volumes of compressed air to break-up the soil around the base without damaging the roots."

For added protection, the garden's team have mulched around the base of the trees.

Visitors also want to get up close to our garden beds for the obligatory selfie, and our plants often get trampled in the process. Rather than rope off the beds, some of our collection curators have created pathways right through their beddings.

Flower Garden

- 1. Cut back spent flower heads on perennials and lilies.
- 2. Tie up taller growing plants like chrysanthemums and asters before they get too tall and full over.
- 3. Remove Summer flowering annuals as they finish flowering to make way for Winter/Spring flowering annuals.
- 4. As the weather cools Spring bulbs should be planted in the ground or in pots.
- 5. Cuttings of geraniums and fuchsias taken now will give good plants next Spring for planting out.
- Plant pansies, primulas, polyanthus, poppies and violas now for good Winter displays.

Fruit & Vegetable Garden

- 1. Plant Winter brassicas.
- 2. Feed leeks and keep well watered.



- 3. Spray stone fruit trees for leaf curl with copper sprays and prune.
- Feed and keep citrus trees well watered to ensure good size, juicy fruit.
- 5. Pick apples when ripe. Good firm fruit can be stored by wrapping in tissue

paper placing in a box and storing in a cool dark place.

Enchanting Thailand

Gail Scrivener reflects on the ever colourful Thailand

The Thailand Tour was an amazing experience for the twelve participants from the CHS. Everyday there was adventure to enjoy, sights to see, interesting history, culture and cuisine of this colourful land.

Two experiences stand out for me: While we were staying in Chiang Rai we travelled into the northern Highlands to Doi Tung and the Mae Fah Luang Gardens. These landscaped gardens are situated high up on the mountain of Doi Tung and we were rewarded with a stunning display of familiar plants and flowers. Set over 10 acres, the ornamental gardens owe their existence to the Princess Mother (the late mother of Thailand's present king) who wanted to give those Thai people who have never travelled overseas the opportunity to enjoy a temperate flower garden. The decorative flowers in Mae Fah Luang Garden are grown and nurtured by local villagers who benefit from the tourist revenue and job opportunities offered by the garden.

The other highlight was attending the flower festival parade in Chiang Mai. Chiang Mai is popularly known as 'The Rose of the North' and with its enchanting location on the banks of the Ping River, the city and surroundings are blessed with a stunning natural beauty and a uniquely indigenous cultural identity.

We were fortunate to enjoy the parade from our very own reserved viewing platform. This provided an optimum view for the colourful and creative floats featured in the parade. This year there

PLANT OF THE MONTH Euphorbia Lipstick

The original Euphorbia of this species was from Madagascar and called Euphorbia milii. Euphorbia somona was developed



from this and bred for the European market which meant it was important that it was a compact plant. These were also very popular in tropical Thailand and Taiwan, where they were called Poysean (or Eight Saints) named after the eight saints of Chinese mythology: health, bravery, riches, beauty, art, intelligence, poetry and the ability to overcome evil. Growing one of these outside the home was considered to bring these positive attributes to those within it.

The new lipstick is a larger variety with bigger leaves and flowers and can grow up to a metre. Euphorbias are succulents and have quite sharp thorns, although the thorns on lipstick are softer. An attractive plant ideally suited to a patio or protected area, lipstick will flower freely in late Winter, Spring and Summer with best results in well drained soil, and a drier environment in Winter. Prune lightly in Summer months if required. This plant has a very low water requirement once established and it pays to be careful not to over-water them.
