Swan PlantsGardening for kids of all ages



Next month the third Oderings School Garden Show opens. Here at Oderings we can't wait to see what wonderful creations will emerge from each primary school.

Swan plants are in hot demand this Summer, everyone wants the happiness of watching a caterpillar turning into a beautiful butterfly especially children, there's something so fascinating about it and not to mention is very educational as well

There are two types of swan plants available at Oderings, swan plant 'asclepias physocarpa' and swan plant silky.

Silky has stunning red, gold and deep scarlet flowers which look great in flower arrangements. The other variety has amazing swan like seed pods which develop at full maturity. They are fun for children to float on ponds, and again educational

Swan plants are relatively fast growing and do best in full sun and a well-drained position. They can get to 2 metres tall, and to help protect those caterpillar are best planted in a sheltered spot.

The speed in which Caterpillars munch through the plants is often underestimated.

It takes them no time at all so our top tip is to save a few plants. Plant them away from the caterpillar covered plants and throw a net over the top to prevent butterflies from laying on them. This way you'll have a constant source of food and the caterpillars won't starve.

Please be careful though especially with children as swan plants are poisonous if ingested, so it's a good idea to get kids to wear gloves and supervise them.

tree which is laden with fruit, checking each day as to when they will be ripe enough to pick.

The dwarf peach tree gave me a yield of about $10\ kg$. A bit small but very good flavour, I did thin the fruit but I think that I should have thinned out more, must remember this for next year.

As I did not plant all my vegetable plots at the one time this year I have a much better constant supply. The tomatoes are ripening now so plenty of pulp is being made and frozen for the Winter.

Fruit & Vegetable Garden

- 1. Lift and dry off garlic
- 2. After stone fruit has been picked, prune the trees to encourage new growth for next season's fruit
- 3. Check pip fruit for pest and diseases and treat as needed
- 4. Continue planting and sowing crops as ground becomes available
- 5. Plant leeks and give plenty of fertiliser and water.
- 6. Watch out for pests on the outside of tomatoes and potatoes and treat to prevent infestation
- 7. Water well to keep plants growing

8. Remove spent crop residue as this takes up room and can be a source of pests and diseases

Lawns

- 1. Water and feed lawns to keep them active
- I have seen some grass grub beetles flying so now is the time to treat the lawn
- 3. Mow regularly
- 4. Watch out for brown patches which may be a fungal infection and treat if needed

Flower Garden

- Water regularly to keep plants growing
- Dead head annuals and perennials to encourage flowering
- 3. Prune roses as flowering flush finishes to encourage more flowers
- 4. Keep weeds down before they seed
- 5. Lift daffodil bulbs and store in a cool, dark dry place
- 6. Sow seeds of winter annuals like pansy, poppies and violas
- 7. Prune back any excessive growth on trees and shrubs that may be over paths etc...

AUCKLAND AT ITS BEST & WAIHEKE ISLAND Tour Review, Gail Scrivener

The fittingly named "Auckland at its Best" short break last November exceeded the expectations of all participants, with first class coach transport, excellent accommodation and diverse dining experiences.

On our first day we visited Birthday Hill, Huntingwood and Ayrlies Gardens, with Pinelee, A'La Fois, Mincher and Totara Waters the following day. Each garden was very beautiful, but different from each other, varying from traditional, formal, tropical, large and small with stunning vistas and surrounding scenery.

All of our hosts were generous with their time in sharing their stories and respective plant knowledge.

Our day trip to Waiheke Island was amazing! Beginning with the short smooth

ferry ride to Matiatia where our day commenced with a scenic drive through Church Bay Estate then a visit to Mudbrick Vineyard for a tour with the head gardener followed by a delicious morning tea. We then visited Sacred Blessing Sanctuary garden located in Enclosure Bay on the northern side of Waiheke, a one acre garden surrounded on two sides by McKenzie Reserve, a 12 acre regenerating native reserve. The garden was established ten years ago, however over the last two vears it has been extensively remodelled to include hard landscaping from rock that is unique to Waiheke. Also added is a collection of Paul Dibble bronze sculptures. We were guided around these amazing gardens and learned about Waiheke's unique growing conditions, exotic plants and extensive range of herbs and flowers.

This stunning garden totally wowed us all. We then continued on to Rangihoua Estate where the first olive oil in the North Island was produced. Lunch was enjoyed at Batch Vineyard, the highest vineyard on Waiheke Island, with spectacular 360 degree views over the island and beyond to the Gulf islands.





Our final day included a trip to Devonport to visit the Eden Garden, Winter and Vertumnus Gardens.

Gail Scrivener

Where were you born and where did you spend most of your childhood?

I was born, raised and educated in Christchurch

On leaving high school I entered the travel industry and was fortunate to guide for a variety of interest groups and travel extensively throughout the world. Later I had the privilege of being manger of PGG Travel, Focus Travel, AA Travel Hereford Street and eventually my own travel broking business.

Where do you live now?

I currently live in Tai Tapu; in the Selwyn District on a one acre property which was once the original site of the old Tai Tapu Butter Company.

What aroused your interest in gardening or horticulture?

At the young age of 13 and living on a large suburban section I enjoyed looking after the flower garden, keeping it neat, weeded and watered and generally helping my dad in all aspects of gardening.

My aunt also had an influence on my gardening interests. She was a keen gardener and won many awards for her garden in Memorial Avenue.

What gardening or horticultural interests do you have now?

I am currently the President of the Springston Evening Garden Club for a fourth term, having acted in the secretary and treasurer roles as well.

As the tour manager of the CHS, having taken over the role from Freda Hunter in 2013, I enjoy the challenge of creating a horticulture interest/garden tour with a WOW factor for all to enjoy, whether locally, nationally or internationally.

What's your favourite plant and why?

In my own garden I have a number of favourite plants, rhodos, hydrangeas and perennials but roses are my favourite as they

never disappoint for display and resilience. In my previous home I had over 300 roses but pruning was always a mission.

During my time at the CHS I have learned much from the experience and knowledge of some of our older members, especially regarding the choice of planting, growing and general care of my plants.

What's been your most challenging and/or rewarding gardening project? The post-earthquake task of redeveloping a new garden from a building site, which is only

in its first year and incorporating it into the existing garden areas was huge. I am hopeful the new garden, combined with the pre-existing one will be much easier to maintain.

When did you join the CHS and why?

I joined the CHS in 2008 after my mother died. I started by assisting Freda with the CHS Ellerslie tour programmes on a voluntary basis although I had an earlier affiliation with the CHS through my involvement with the Springston Evening Garden Club.

What is your passion for the future of the CHS?

Supporting any initiatives for the younger generation such as garden competitions for schools. Continuing to develop a varied, interesting tour programme for learning, fellowship and fun for lasting memorable experiences and meeting fellow passionate gardeners and plant lovers to share knowledge and enjoy.
