WEEDBUSTERS Funding available

The QEII Community Weedbusters Project is a joint programme run by Weedbusters NZ and the QEII National Trust. The project supports voluntary weedbusting efforts by community groups in priority regions around the country.

Some of this funding has been set aside to help out weedbusting groups and individuals/couples with 'small scale' costs such as tools, herbicides, mulcher hire, greenwaste disposal, promotional activities within communities to get more folk involved.

There are a few conditions around this:

- Groups or individuals must have registered as Weedbusters through the online registration page.
- Projects can be on public land, or on private land where two or more landowners are working together to clear areas of weeds by either targeting specific high-risk species or as part of a wider restoration project. The project is not to be based in private gardens (not including undeveloped gullies) or on productive farmland.

M J BARNETT MEMORIAL LECTURE Dr Gary Houliston

Threatened plant species – history, literature and modern developments

This Lecture is the finale of our Winter Speaker Series, **Our Living Landscape** *Origins - where did I come from?*

The M J Barnett Memorial Lecture is conducted by the Canterbury Horticultural Society in honour of the memory of the late Mr M J Barnett, Director of the Christchurch Botanic Gardens for over 30 years.

Dr Gary Houliston graduated with a Ph.D. in Botany from the University of Canterbury in 2003. His thesis topic was the reproduction and population genetics of Hieracium in New Zealand. Following this, he was a post-doc at the University of Alaska, Fairbanks, working on the genetic of male sterility in Silene. Returning to New Zealand he was hired by Landcare Research as a conservation geneticist, leading the Conservation Genetics programme at Landcare over the last six years. He has also spent considerable time working on invasive species and the assessment methods for plant importations. Within this work programme Gary has done considerable work on what makes plants invasive, and will share some of his findings from this work. Gary has recently taken on the leadership of the Enhancing Biodiversity research Portfolio at Landcare Research, and will also provide a brief overview of the range of work in this area.

MONTHLY TIPS & TASKS with Michael Coulter

August is the last month of Winter or the start of Spring? This is my annual quandary because it is a bit of both; cold and wet at the start then becoming milder as the first signs of growth and flowers appear. This is the time when we should complete Winter pruning and spray programmes on fruit trees and plant new fruit trees, and berry fruits.

For those who have a greenhouse seed sowing can begin, especially if you have some way of giving bottom heat for early tomatoes and other tender plants. Ground may be prepared by digging in green crops or compost as the soil becomes dry enough to work so that it is ready for planting seedlings or sowing seeds in a few weeks time.

The weeds have been growing over the Winter and crops like garlic and broadbeans really need to be kept weed free to ensure that they will give a good crop.

Towards the end of the month hardier crops may be sown, if the ground allows, such as onions, peas, carrots, silverbeet, spinach and brassicas.

Early potatoes in warmer parts of the garden can be planted, but as they grow be ready to give them some frost protection or try growing some in a potato pot (available at Oderings). Fruit trees will benefit from an application of fertiliser now, something we often forget about.

The lawns will begin to grow towards the end of the month and will need some attention after Winter dormancy. Treat for moss and then give the grass a good rake to lift any thick thatch, cut and then aerate the lawn to improve drainage. This should be done over 2 to 3 weeks to allow the moss treatment to work, then the application of fertiliser may be applied once the grass has started to grow next month.

As Winter flowering shrubs finish flowering they should be pruned to encourage next seasons flowers and keep them in a natural shape. This is also the time when potted plants are able to be re-potted just before they start to grow so that they will get the benefit from the fresh potting mix as they make new growth.

In the greenhouse have a good clean out and dispose of any plants that are diseased or have infestations of pests, then spray for pests and diseases on the remaining plants so that there is no carry-over to this growing season onto new plants. Starting the season off with good hygiene around the garden will help prevent problems during the coming season.

Landscape Design Trends 2017 Hyperlocalism

There are several key trends to be aware of in 2017, one of which is hyperlocalism. For a long time landscape architects and designers have been enjoying using NZ native plants in their designs. Natives are unique, beautiful, hardy and thrive in our soils. There is a growing trend towards hyperlocalism - using plants that are found only in very particular parts of New Zealand. So for example, there are some lovely plants in the Canterbury area such as the Canterbury Daisy – Olearia adenocarpa.

This wild, rambling shrub looks great in a large lifestyle garden and thrives on our shallow stony Canterbury soils. The local beach sedge Pingao is an unusual orange spiky plant that can be used in sandy, sunny spots. Even landscaping

MEMBER OF THE MONTH

Matthew Beuzenberg

Where were you born and where did you spend most of your childhood?

I was born in Christchurch and spent most of my childhood in Heathcote Valley and then in Cracroft.

Where do you live now?

I am currently living in Cracroft with my parents and brother. I am attending Cashmere High School as a year 12 student (6th form).

What aroused your interest in gardening or horticulture?

I suppose that my interest in horticulture was aroused by my interest in birds. I started by planting plants such as NZ flax for bird feed. But then I realised that there was so much more to gardening than just for feeding birds. And slowly my interest in horticulture overtook my interest in birds. Recently I have spent time with the Botanic Gardens staff – 2 days work experience. I thoroughly enjoyed this. Also recently I have spent 2 days work experience with Landcare Research. Very very interesting.

What gardening or horticultural interests do you have now?

I am mainly interested in native plants, but also in vegetables. I propagate a small number of plants in an old bird aviary and I'm replanting a corner of my parent's property in natives (see photo). I also have a vegetable patch, where I grow lots of silver beet for my finches. The green crop did not germinate this year, but I have an idea that it has something to do with hungry mice!

What's your favourite plant and why?

My favourite plant (at the moment) is Plagianthus regius

or ribbonwood. This selection is also echoed by my finches, who find the plant as a very good perch. I have found ribbonwood to grow well where many other plants do not. And it also has an interesting divaricating look while it is young.

What's been your most challenging and/ or rewarding gardening project?

My most challenging gardening project is still happening! I am restoring a CCC reserve next to my

parent's property that was burnt in the recent Port Hills fire (although flu and cold rainy weather is holding me back). I have, after long chains of emails, got just over 300 native plants. I am currently in the process of site preparation, which includes cutting down burnt vegetation, dead gorse and broom. The grass is growing long again, so there is still lots to do...

When did you join the CHS and why?

I joined the CHS in 2016, as I wanted to learn more about horticulture and meet like-minded people. The CHS ran two short horticulture courses last year, which I attended. They taught me more about horticulture than a whole year of horticulture/agriculture class taught me at school. The CHS has allowed me to meet other people with the same interests, which I am thankful for.

What is your passion for the future of the CHS?

I would like to see more young people join in, as it is a great society.
