The CHS Ramblers year got underway on a clear twenty plus degree early February day in Fendalton *(image right).*

HERB OF THE MONTH Canterbury Herb Society

Dandelion Taraxacum officinale



A member of the Asteraceae family, this plant has

a variety of descriptive names around the world, eg Blow ball, Lion's Tooth, Cankerwort, Priest's Snout.

We pull out this perennial regarding it as a weed, but over many years it has proved to be a valuable herb. The plant has a long strong taproot, jagged, hairless leaves forming a base rosette, and hollow stemmed single flower heads which mature to form the "dandelion clock" we all know so well. All plant stems have a milky sap. The plant is smooth, cold, soft and moist to the touch, has an earthy, slightly savoury smell, the leaves are bitter, salty and pleasant to the taste, while the flower petals are sweet tasting. The young leaves may be eaten as a spring salad, the flower petals used in salads, in baking, and in drinks, the insulin rich roots, collected in autumn can be dried and used as a coffee substitute. All parts of the plant are a useful stimulant for liver and kidney function and have a high insulin content. The white latex in the stems is useful to treat warts .

If cultivated, the plants can provide an attractive, useful, quite large yellow flowered border plant. BUT, remember to snip off the seed "clock" heads before they mature and fly away or you may regret it!

MONTHLY TIPS & TASKS with Michael Coulter

April is when Autumn really gets going, the days are noticeably shorter and night temperatures cooler. The trees are starting to colour up and drop so we need to be preparing the garden for Winter.

As plants finish their flowering or fruiting then we need to cut back perennials, prune berry fruits, do clean up sprays on fruit trees so that any pest or disease will not be carried over to the next season.

In the vegetable garden any unused ground may be sown in a green crop and as crops finish the ground cleared of weeds.

The lawns are starting to grow quicker so now is the best time to get on and repair,

feed, rake out the thatch and treat for broad leaf weeds.

Spring bulbs may still be planted and Winter flowering annuals should be now finished planting by the end of the month.

Autumn is also a good time to plant some trees and shrubs so that they will have time to make new roots before the ground gets too cold and wet.

Tomato plants will be getting to the end of their season so remove the old plants and dispose of the vines, especially if they had any disease, best not to compost them.

Dig potatoes if the ground is likely to get water logged and store in a cool dark place, I generally only lift my potatoes as I need them as I have found that they keep better that way for me. There are many other tasks that are best done before winter, one I consider important is to cut back over hanging branches on trees or shrubs along pathways and to treat the paths for moss so that we are safe when the weather is wet and cold. Any frost tender plants will need to be moved inside if in containers or covered for protection once the harder frosts start. Summer bulbs, corms or tubers should be lifted and stored for the winter before the hard frosts can damage them.
