If you are growing heirloom varieties, you have the option to save your own seed and know that next season you can grow that same variety from your own harvested seed. If you are keen to try this, here are some tips and tricks to keep in mind:

Choose your best performing plants to be your seed producers

The seed you save will produce plants that directly reflect the characteristics of the parent plants. Choose plants that are healthy and are producing the ideal crop so that these qualities are passed on to next season's plants. Consider marking the plants you intend to use for seed harvesting so that you don't accidentally harvest it for the kitchen!

Learner's Corner Saving your own Seed

Timing – you need your seeds to mature fully before you collect them

If you harvest a seed too early, it may not have the stored nutrients it will require to germinate, grow well or stay viable until the following season.

How is the seed produced?

Is the seed encased within a fleshy fruit (e.g. tomato, capsicum, cucumber etc.)? If so, allow the fruit to become fully, or even a little over-ripe, before collecting the seed. You will need to separate the seed from the fruit - sometimes this can be done by soaking. If the seed is the edible part of the crop (e.g. beans, peas, corn), you may need to allow the seed to fully dry before harvesting it. If the seed shatters and scatters readily as it matures (e.g. lettuce, onions, mustard), you may need

to place a paper bag over the seed heads to collect the seed and prevent it from scattering. Do some research on how to save seed for particular varieties so that you know what to do.

Drying seed?

Seed needs to be completely dry before storage. Different seed varieties will need different methods of drying – you may be able to hang seeds to dry, allow them to dry on the plants before collecting, or you may need to dry them on paper towels to remove soft plant tissue.

Storing seed?

Seed needs to be stored in cool, dry conditions, out of the light. Keep them in an insect-proof container. Remember to label your seeds, so that next season you know what they are. You think you will remember, but you may not! Label everything! Find out how long you can store a seed variety before it will naturally reduce in viability. For example, lettuce, onion and parsnip seed will store for one season, whereas brassica seeds can remain viable for around five years.

Germination?

You can test the germination rate of your saved seed before the sowing season begins. This involves choosing around 100 seeds and moistening them and allow them to germinate, then checking how many seeds have sprouted. If you have a poor germination rate, you will know that you are better to purchase fresh seed instead of relying on a poor batch of saved seed that season.

Monthly Tips & Tasks with Michael Coulter

Spring has now arrived, and in my garden plants are really moving into growth. The weather has been on the dry side with only 4 mm of rain at the time of writing, for August we would expect 40 mm so it is dry. The Spring bulbs will need to have some water if this dry spell continues so that they can grow well and be in good condition to produce flowers next year.

The apricot, peach and nectarine are in full flower now which is about 2 weeks earlier than usual so hopefully there will not be any hard frosts that can damage the flowers. The soil is now dry enough to dig over and work up to make a good friable soil ready for seed sowing or the transplanting of seedlings. Winter flowering camellias should be pruned as they finish flowering to keep them in shape and in good condition to make next years flower buds on the new growth that they will make in the spring, this also applies to any other Winter flowering shrubs like Daphne etc.

Later in the month citrus can have a citrus fertiliser dressing around the drip line just before they start to grow, also a mulch should now be renewed or added around the drip line. Seed sowing of Summer vegetables and bedding plants may be started in the greenhouse to be ready for planting outside when the warmer weather arrives. Many perennials are starting to grow and cuttings can be taken now or plants can be lifted and divided to give new more healthy plants. Begonias will be starting to shoot away, place them in a warm place where they will get good light to develop strong shoots that can be used for cuttings.

Re-pot any plants in outside containers that have been in the pots for more than 2 or 3 years using a shrub and tub potting mix, before they start to grow this will keep them fresh and healthy.

The lawns are growing and will benefit from regular mowing. Fertilising and weed control are now important for the grass to grow well and form a good swathe ready for the warmer Summer temperatures. Any area of the lawn that has been compacted during the Winter would benefit from aeration by fork or coring, Sand in the cores will help to prevent this compaction.

Tomatoes may be planted in a warm green house to get some early fruit but it's better to wait until November if planting outside. Early potatoes that have been chitted can be planted but be prepared to protect them from any frosts once they have emerged from the ground.
