

Floral Design

Wednesday 16 June 2pm

Theme: The 7 grasses of Autumn, roadside ikebana.

Flowers: anything on your roadside, park or left in your garden.

Other material: grasses, seed heads, branches, anything growing wild in your neighbourhood or garden.

Container: a shallow dish container for this. Any shape but not too small.

Mechanics: a Kensan or pin folder.

Note, try to find about 7 different types of plant material. Look for different heights, textures and forms and try to keep the selection harmonious.



and keep the weeds down.

In the **flower garden** perennials will benefit from lifting and dividing, I like to put the divisions into pots to grow on ready to plant back in spring.

Dahlias should be lifted and stored for the winter. Once they have finished flowering **Chrysanthemums** should be cut back by two thirds or lifted, trimmed and put into trays or pots ready to produce shoots for cuttings in the spring.

Monthly Tips & Tasks with Michael Coulter

June means winter is here. Fortunately we've had some rain but more is needed to increase soil moisture to a point were it is no longer in deficit.

The last of the leaves will have fallen so now is the time to give the whole garden a good clean up, removing all the leaves, weeds and plants that have finished.

Pruning fruit trees can be started but only on fine sunny days, there is no great hurry yet!

June is a great time to plant **garlic**. Use only good healthy cloves that are firm.

Winter vegetables will benefit from a hoe to loosen up the soil

cut at a higher level. Any signs of grass grub may still be treated. Winter is a good time to service lawn mowers. Keeping them in good cutting condition will ensure they are ready for spring grass growth. Other winter time tasks include

Other winter time tasks include keeping paths clear of over hanging plants and removing moss and leaves so that they are not slippery.

Raised beds come in a huge variety of designs and materials these days and are a convenient way to grow vegetables, flowers and shrubs. Winter is a good time to build them so they're ready for spring planting - time to get creative!

Gardeners with **green houses** should undertake maintenance and cleaning now in time for the start of the growing season.

Herb of the Month

Parsley is the 2021 Herb of the Year of the International Herb Association as well as the New Zealand Herb Federation.

There are several kinds of parsley but two types are much used in New Zealand namely curly parsley (petroselinum crispum) and flat leaved variety, Italian parsley (petroselinum petroselinum crispum var. neapolitanum).

It is one of the most versatile and much loved and used culinary herbs. Parsley is a wonderful fresh addition to sauces, salads, and any dish that could use a pop of colour and a touch of herbal flavour. Use parsley generously in savoury dishes and combine with other herbs. The traditional combination of a bouquet garni consists of

parsley, thyme, and bay leaf, which goes in a pot of stock, stew or soup. Add chopped parsley at the last minute to ensure that it retains all its goddess and freshness. Or make a Gremolata (an Italian condiment made of about 1/4 cup Italian chopped parsley, 1 minced clove of garlic and the zest of 1 or two lemons) and sprinkle just before serving, over rich winter stews, roast chicken or seafood - yum!

The herb is rich in antioxidants, calcium, iron, vitamin C and vitamin K as well as chlorophyll. It is said to support bone health and even reduce inflammation.

Parsley roots, seeds and leaves have a long history of medicinal use and might help stimulate the appetite, improve digestion, increase urine production, reduce spasms, and increase menstrual flow. It is important

to note general information relating to various medical conditions and herbal medicine does not substitute advice provided by your doctor or qualified health professional.

Grow it in easy reach of the kitchen and ensure that you have a constant supply to grow year round. Over summer parsley is prone to go to seed. To avoid this water your parsley consistently, regularly pick, remove flowers and parts of the plant that go to seed. If your parsley does go to seed, the positive is that beneficial insects like bees love the flowers.

Never underestimate this wonderful herb.
