Monthly Tips & Tasks

with Michael Coulter

April really is the start of Autumn, the leaves are changing colour and the mornings are cooler. I have been busy harvesting apples and tomatoes and also getting the last of my winter vegetable crops planted.

As the ground cools it's time to get the spring bulbs planted. Winter annuals will also need to be planted to get some growth before the onset of colder winter weather.

Lawns

Look for signs of fungi infection and treat if needed (bravo or thiram are effective).

Treat for grass grub, especially if you have a new lawn.

Do any repairs and top dressing to areas that have damage.

Mow each week but not too low and catch the clippings.

Feed the grass just as the autumn growth starts to build the plants up before winter.

Flower Garden

Remove summer annuals as they finish their flowering.

Plant spring bulbs

Cut back summer flowering perennials by about two thirds.

Take cuttings of pelargoniums to get plants for next season.

Fuchsia cuttings may be taken now.

Sweet peas sown now will give early flowers next season.

Plant poppies, pansies, violas, polyanthus, forget me nots and primulas for Winter and Spring flowers.

Fruit & Vegetable Garden

Remove any diseased or insect damaged fruit from trees or ground beneath trees.

Plant the last of the winter brassicas and treat for white butterfly.

Compost crop waste with autumn leaves to use next season.

Sow green crops on spare ground to improve the soil.

Remove the old fruiting canes of raspberries and give a copper spray for fungi diseases.

The first sowing of broad beans can be made at the end of the month.

Keep leeks well fed and weed free to get the best results.

Herb of the Month

Common Sage (Salvia officinalis)

This is a popular culinary, medicinal and ornamental herb with a multitude of uses It have silver-greyish leaves and bears attractive flowers which are purple-blue in colour. It is also a versatile drought-tolerant grey foliage plant and is very hardy as it often bounces back in the spring even after a severely cold winter. It grows well after a good prune and it prefers to grow in welldrained soil. It seems that the plant prefer having a shelter behind them. The purpleblue flowers attract beneficial insects. It is a perennial plant and should be cut back after flowering.

Sage goes well with fatty meats in particular like pork and poultry (duck and chicken) but also with pulses (eg chickpeas and beans). It feature in many Italians recipes such as ravioli stuffed with pumpkin and sage, liver and veal, and they use sage to flavour wonderful tomato dishes. They also wrap small game birds with sage before roasting.

Sage is in high esteem for health. It is an antiseptic, tonic and anti fungal and it is said to aid digestion and help with blood circulation. It is even claimed it might be able to help control sugar blood levels according to https://www.webmd.com/ diet/health-benefits-sage. Sip sage tea (pour 1 cup boiling water over 1 tablespoon coarsely fresh sage leaves, cover and infuse for about 15 minutes and strain) use it as a gargle for a sore throat or for mouth ulcers and infected gums. Or drink a tea sweetened with honey if wished. Plant common sage as companion plant in the garden close to carrots and cabbage as it is said it protects carrots against the carrot-fly and cabbages against the cabbage moth and it grows well with rosemary as neighbour.Feel free to cut and arrange the blooms in a vase, or use the edible blue flowers to garnish food or serve

Join Collection curator Luke Martin for a walk through the New Zealand plant collection. Luke will point out the different ecosystems and plant communities represented in the collection and explain the conservation work carried out at the Botanic Gardens.

Luke has previously worked in a number of roles for the Department of Conservation (DOC) from Arthurs pass to Fiordland, the Chathams and Norfolk islands carrying out vegetation and bird surveys and working in the DOC nursery at Motukarara. Luke completed his horticultural apprenticeship at the Christchurch Botanic Gardens, returning in 2018 as the Curator of the NZ plant collection. He has been fortunate to obtain seed collection permits for a number of rare species and journeyed to the Sub Antartic islands on a seed collecting trip in 2020. us, and how we are all responsible for our share in protecting this precious resource. Soil is a life-changing read - part warning, part lament and part manual full of hope and optimism. It provides a global perspective on the earth's life-giving thin veneer - from the Arctic to New Zealand explaining how we've stripped 92 percent of the nutrient that enables ecosystems to function naturally.

New Zealand features, sadly, in Chapter 3: 'The Earth's Kidneys: when good soil turns bad'. Like all countries around the world, New Zealand has poisoned its soil. In our case it's with cadmium in phosphate fertilisers on dairy farms. Now two thirds of all our rivers are un-swimmable and three quarters of native fresh water fish species are under threat of extinction due to the run-off from dairy farms.
