

Monthly Tips & Tasks

with Michael Coulter

As the Summer weather arrives many gardeners will be looking to navigate water restrictions and charges. Maximising the effectiveness of hand watering is crucial.

In the past I've used NovaFlow drainage pipes, these can be buried near trees and shrubs and filled on permitted days or with collected rainwater. This is an efficient way to channel water directly to the plant roots.

When it comes to tomatoes or veggies, creating shallow hollows or strategically placing plant pots can help to provide a measured water supply for each plant.

In the Flower Garden: Summer flower planting is underway, with emphasis on drought-resistant choices like geraniums and portulaca.

Shrub Care: Post-flowering, prune camellias and rhododendrons, followed by mulching for moisture retention. For new trees or shrubs, blend water-holding granules with the soil

Vegetable Garden: Summer-friendly plants—tomatoes, peppers, pumpkins, beans—are ready for outdoor planting. Watch for late frosts and space out successive harvests.

Fruit Department - Food for the Soul: Vigilance against pests and diseases intensifies as plants set fruit. Delay spraying apples until petal drop to protect bees during flowering.

Pests and Diseases: Combat aphids with a timely spray, and anticipate codling moth later in the month. Address powdery mildew on apples and roses with fungicidal spray. Regular insecticide application is crucial for potatoes, tomatoes, and peppers due to the

potato psyllid threat.

Garden Life December

Main Speaker: Wolfgang Bopp The Gardens of Japan

Wednesday 6 December 1pm and 7pm
The stunning gardens of Japan have drawn
Wolfgang Bopp, Director of the Christchurch
Botanic Gardens, to visit six times. From
arid gardens to moss-covered sanctuaries,
serene ponds, thoughtfully arranged stones
(ishigumi), blooming cherry trees, and
vibrant autumn hues, Wolfgang will unveil the
beauty of Tokyo and Kyoto's most remarkable
gardens and temples.

About Wolfgang Bopp

Wolfgang, originally from Germany, turned his lifelong hobby into a horticulture career. After plant research and a move to the UK in 1991 for the Botanic Gardens Diploma, he contributed to the World List of Threatened Trees. Roles followed at Ness Botanic Gardens and as the first Curator of the National Botanic Gardens of Wales. Later, as Director of the Sir Harold Hillier Gardens, he managed one of the world's most diverse plant collections. For a decade, Wolfgang served as a trustee for Plantnet and played key roles in the RHS, including judging floral displays at their shows. In 2018, he became Director of the Botanic Gardens and Garden Parks in Christchurch, New Zealand, also serving as a trustee for NZ Gardens Trust and BGANZ. In his leisure, Wolfgang leads garden tours

worldwide, exploring landscapes from South Africa to Japan.

New Zealand Mistletoe

Here in New Zealand we have nine native mistletoes; although one species has not been seen since about 1954.

We all hear about mistletoe at Christmas as it is tied up in a number of traditional Christmas songs. In the UK a piece of green, leafy mistletoe is hung decoratively (without flowers due to it being Wintertime.

Here in New Zealand many of our mistletoes flower at

Christmastime; from the very bright to the minute.

Mistletoe, being semi-parasitic, thrive by growing on host plants and, unfortunately, eventually lead to their demise. Despite this, they

boast an abundance of flowers that later yield copious quantities of fruit.

In Alan's presentation, you'll encounter visuals of all our Mistletoes, including the extinct variety. Many of these images are captured in Canterbury, offering a rewarding glimpse into their world for those who time their visit just right.

Soil to Table: The Land Gardeners

The Land Gardeners – Bridget Elworthy and Henrietta Courtauld – are gardeners and healthy soil researchers and advocates based in the UK. Their first book, Cut Flowers, focused on the role of healthy soil in growing beautiful blooms. Soil to Table is a stunning follow-up, combining their passion for soil science and health with a growing desire to see their research used in the food and farming space.

Soil to Table is a truly sumptuous, large format book – it's a work of art, with paintings and photography throughout. The first few chapters are dedicated to soil health and gardening advice, based on their experiences in their own gardens. The next chapters are divided into mealtimes, and feature recipes by renowned chef Lulu Cox, with profiles of many different

ingredients. Throughout, there are musings and teachings on food, planting, community, health and environmental impact. This is a book to spend lots of time with, revisiting at every stage of the growing (and eating!) Process.



While The Land Gardeners are based in the UK, they have worked all over the world, and have a particular fondness for New Zealand, citing Kay Baxter as of the Koanga Institute as a key inspiration for their work. This edition of Soil to Table is specific to New Zealand, Australia, and the USA, and profiles a number of growers, farmers and producers working on connecting food back to soil in their own contexts. Through this, The Land Gardeners have created a book that brings a global community of like-minded people together.

This book is really something special. Practical, inspirational, warm, and incredibly beautiful, it is an absolute treasure.
