Main Speaker: Wolfgang Bopp The Gardens of Japan Wednesday 6 December 1pm & 7pm



The stunning gardens of Japan have drawn Wolfgang Bopp, Director of the Christchurch Botanic Gardens, to visit six times. From arid gardens to moss-covered sanctuaries, serene ponds, thoughtfully arranged stones (ishigumi), blooming cherry trees, and vibrant autumn hues, Wolfgang will unveil the beauty of Tokyo and Kyoto's most remarkable gardens and temples.

*Mini Speaker:* Alan Jolliffe New Zealand Mistletoe

In New Zealand we have nine native mistletoes; although one species has not been seen since about 1954. We all hear about mistletoe at Christmas as it is tied up in a number of traditional Christmas songs. In the UK a piece of green, leafy mistletoe is hung decoratively (without flowers due to it being Wintertime). Here in NZ many of our mistletoes flower at Christmastime; from the very bright to the minute.

In Alan's presentation, you'll encounter visuals of all our native mistletoes, including an extinct variety. Many of these images are captured in Canterbury, offering a rewarding glimpse into their world for those who time their visit just right.

## Monthly Tips & Tasks

#### with Michael Coulter

This month is the start of the Summer fruit season with berry fruits at their peak and stone fruit starting to ripen.

With longer days and the warmer temperatures these fruits will ripen quickly so they must be looked at each day and are best picked in the cooler mornings before they get too hot. This will help them to keep longer. My pip fruit have had a good fruit set and will need to be thinned to ensure that the fruit will be of a good size, also the preventative spray programme to control coddling moth, mites and mildew at this time of the growing season is very important.

Tomatoes growing in the green house will now be ripening so the removal of the bottom leaves to help air flow needs to be carried out. Regular watering of the tomatoes both in the green house and outside, along with liquid feeds will help prevent any blossom end rot on the fruit.

Watering of the gardens and lawns and conserving water use is what the Council is asking us to do. To keep our gardens in good condition we will need to manage our water use by using mulches to retain soil moisture and avoid water wastage by only directing watering to the base of plants. Not using maximum pressure, using soak hoses not sprinklers when windy and avoiding excessive over spray onto paths or drive ways. I still recommend that a good deep watering once a week to ten days is more efficient than a quick splash around each day. Watering pots also needs to be managed to avoid water wastage. Give the pots only enough water to keep the pot moist; watering until it comes out the bottom wastes water.

I grow a lot of plants in pots and dependant on the weather my pots may need to be watered only every other day or so. I find that about 5 to 10 seconds of water per pot is enough. We know that more plants die from over watering than anything else.

Plants grow very fast during the Summer months, many of the taller perennials will need to be staked before they get too tall to keep them in bounds and straight stems.

Chrysanthemums, Dahlias and some annuals all benefit from pinching out their growing tip; this helps to make them branch and stops them getting too tall when they flower later on.

Secret Gardens of Aotearoa is a beautiful book that showcases twelve intriguing and unique gardens and the people who tend to them, along with advice, guides, and plenty of stunning photography.

Written and photographed by Banks Peninsula local Jane Mahoney and her daughter Sophie Bannan, this book focuses on smaller, 'home garden' scale gardens, all selected for their passionate, creative gardeners who understand the value of knowledge sharing.

Within the pages of this beautiful book, we visit an enchanting and productive 'pocket farm' in suburban Auckland; a stunning flower garden amongst the sheep and beef farms in rural Canterbury; small, terraced



home gardens next door to native bush in Wellington; and a food forest in the yard of an unlikely Coromandel subdivision. The profiles of each gardener are a particular highlight of this book, representing a huge range of experiences, backgrounds, and hard-won learning that New Zealanders

bring to their diverse garden spaces. The advice they bring, too, is wonderfully varied: from recycling old concrete paths into retaining walls to propagating succulents; from recipes for garden teas to tips for effective pest control; and everything in between.

*Secret Gardens of Aotearoa* is a special book, and one that will encourage you to look

at your own garden, whatever its size and purpose, with fresh eyes. It will also inspire you to peer through gates and over fences of ordinary-looking urban homes, curious about the possibilities even small, unassuming spaces can contain. Many thanks to Scorpio Books for this review.
