

June in the Garden *Tasks for the first frosts*

As the Christchurch weather turns colder and the first frosts begin to settle in, we find ourselves well and truly into late Autumn and edging into Winter. The crisp mornings and shorter days mean it's time to switch gears in the garden. With fewer opportunities to work outside, it's a good idea to make the most of those clear, fine days when they arrive.

What to Focus on this Month:

1. General Clean-up & Pruning

Now's the time to tidy up garden beds—remove old annuals, fallen leaves, and dead growth. Fruit trees and roses can be pruned over the Winter months, but make sure to wait until they are fully dormant. Clean, sharp tools are essential to avoid damaging branches and to promote faster healing.

2. Tool Maintenance

Speaking of tools, use the quieter garden time to clean and sharpen secateurs, loppers, spades, and any other equipment that worked hard over Summer. Lawnmowers should be serviced too—so you're ready for the Spring growth flush.

3. Compost Management

If you've been gathering up those beautiful fallen leaves, don't forget to turn your compost heap regularly. Mixing in green material such as vegetable scraps or fresh grass clippings will help balance the carbonrich leaves and speed decomposition.

4. Greenhouse Jobs

Winter is a good time to give your greenhouse a fresh start. Remove any shade cloths or spent crops, wash down interior surfaces, and scrub away moss and grime. Finish with a disinfectant wash to reduce the risk of pests or disease overwintering.

Winter Planting and Preparation

Prepare For:

- New fruit trees arriving in nurseries over Winter. Get your planting sites ready by digging over the soil and incorporating compost or aged manure.
- Browse plant and seed catalogues from specialist nurseries. Now is the perfect time to plan ahead, especially if you're looking for more unusual varieties not available in standard garden centres.

Plant Now:

- Garlic and broad beans can be sown now—they'll thrive in the cooler months.
- Spring-flowering plants such as pansies, polyanthus, poppies, and lilies can also go in the ground.
- Strawberry plants should be planted now to establish a good root system before Spring. Look out for day-neutral varieties for extended harvests



Plant of the Month

Meyer Citrus in a Pot

Meyer lemon trees are a popular choice because of their ability to fruit almost continuously throughout the year once established. They are also one of the cold hardiest lemon varieties.

Meyers grow great in pots. To start off with the pot doesn't need to be too big, about twice the size of the original pot. As we are going into Winter, and nights are getting colder and a big pot full of potting mix can hold a lot of water and

even though Meyers are cold hardy they don't like wet feet. Don't over water them, they can dry out a bit between watering, especially in Winter. Meyers in pots need slightly different feeding.



Always use a good quality potting mix. One that is designed for citrus or create your won by mixing equal parts of potting soil, perlite and peat moss. Winter is the perfect time to put layers of mulch around your plant and keep your lemon tree weed free.

Feed your Meyer in Spring and Summer with citrus food for

containers and pots. This will encourage maximum fruiting and flowering.

Citrus require high levels of potassium and magnesium. Epsom salts help with yellowing leaves. Prune your lemon trees if you need to for either a desired shape, or to improve air circulation. Avoid pruning in September and October as this is when lemon tree borers lay their eggs in fresh cuts.

Growing Meyer lemon trees in pots also means that they can be moved around. Citrus does not like frost. Although Meyers are more tolerant, they still require protection from prolonged or severe frosts. Move under the eaves of your houser, spray with vaporgard, or protect with frost cloth.

Mini Speaker: Steve Bush Trees for Canterbury

Steve Bush has been the driving force behind Trees for Canterbury since 1992, transforming it from a small community project into a leading environmental and social enterprise. Under his leadership, the organisation has propagated over 1.1 million native plants and restored more than 100 hectares of native bush across the region.

Steve champions native species such as kahikatea and tī kōuka, and his commitment to sustainability is reflected in the nursery's use of recycled materials and inclusive practices.

He was recognised by the CHS in 2019 with an Outstanding Horticulturalist Award and in the 2020 New Year Honours list with a Queen's Service Medal of for his significant contributions to conservation and community engagement in Waitaha.
