July in the Garden Tasks for Winter

Winter has settled over Ōtautahi with its usual mix of changeable weather and light frosts. With the shortest day behind us, gardeners can begin looking ahead and making progress on key Winter tasks.

Pruning is a major focus this month. Fruit trees and roses should be pruned now, along with many other deciduous shrubs and trees. With foliage gone, it's easier to assess structure and shape. If you missed Michael Brown's pruning demonstration head over to our youtube page for a quick refresher.

Perennials that have died back can be cut to ground level, and many may also benefit from being lifted and divided to maintain health and control size. Removing old, dead leaves — such as those over hosta crowns — can help reduce the presence of overwintering pests.

Autumn-planted **poppies and pansies** may be beginning to flower. Regular removal of spent blooms will encourage continued flowering throughout the colder months. As **Spring bulbs** begin to emerge, care should be taken when working around garden beds to avoid damaging tender shoots. Large, old leaves from hellebores can be removed now to reveal winter flowers more clearly.

In the **vegetable garden**, this is the time to plant garlic, shallots, and broad beans. Green manure crops can be dug in, and lime added to areas being prepared for Spring brassicas.

On sunny days, it's worthwhile to weed around Winter vegetables such as leeks to minimise competition and encourage steady growth. Rhubarb crowns can be lifted, divided, and replanted into compost-rich, sunny areas.

Now is also a good time to propagate geraniums by taking cuttings before any hard frosts affect established plants.

Colder, wet days are ideal for indoor planning. Reviewing plantings, assessing gaps, and organising seed or fertiliser needs now can help spread the cost and effort before the busy Spring season begins.



New Seasons Roses

Hybrid Teas, traditionally a single rose on a long stem, great for picking, many Hybrid Teas are fragrant.

Floribunda, multiple flowers on one stem, very showy. They make a great choice for your garden border mixing in beautifully with perennials. Crossed with Hybrid Tea roses, great improvements have been made in the flower formation, while they still retain

their vigour and freedom of blooming.

David Austin and Old-fashioned roses

English roses were named by rose breeder David Austin. Great range of colours with character of an old rose, repeat flowering with fragrance. Old Fashioned are easy to grow, mainly in an informal manner so great for mixed beds or borders. Ideal for hedging and background plants or up walls and fences
